



Student Visa Process for Italy

Do I Need a Student Visa?

If you have a U.S. passport:

- **For programs under 90 days:** No visa is required for tourism/study in the [Schengen Area](#) (including Italy).
- **For programs over 90 days:** You **must** apply for a **Student Visa** (also called a National Visa or Long Stay Visa).

If you have an EU (European Union) passport:

- You **most likely** do **NOT** need a Student Visa, even for programs longer than 90 days. Let ASA know if you hold an EU passport.

If your passport is from a non-U.S. or non-EU country:

- You **will** need a Student Visa for programs longer than 90 days, and possibly even for shorter programs. Contact ASA immediately if you have a passport from a non-U.S. or non-EU country.

Your Passport

- **The Consulate will keep your passport** during the visa processing, so avoid international travel during the 3 months before your ASA program. If travel is unavoidable, contact ASA ASAP (617-327-9388) to coordinate.
- **Check your passport expiration:** Your passport must be valid for at least **4 months** beyond your return date from Italy. For example, if you return on **June 30, 2027**, your passport must not expire before **October 31, 2027**. If your passport expires before this date, renew it immediately.
- **Expedited passport processing:** If you need a new passport, we recommend expedited processing, which takes about 2-3 weeks. Regular processing can take 6-8 weeks, or longer.
- **Visa appointment requirements:** You must have your **valid passport** in hand before applying for a Student Visa. Make sure it's ready before the ASA application deadline, as you need it to secure your visa appointment.

Applying for your **ITALIAN STUDENT VISA** (Long Term or National Long Term type D Visa)

****It's the student's responsibility** to apply for the visa. ASA cannot apply for you.

Where to Apply:

- **Student Visas are issued by the Consulate General of Italy.** There are 10 Italian consulates in the U.S., each responsible for specific states. For example, the consulate in Boston serves MA, NH, RI, VT, ME. You must apply at the consulate corresponding to either your state of residence or state of study.
- Students who live and study in different consular jurisdictions may apply at one of TWO Consulates. Ex. If you study in NH and live in NY, you can apply for your visa at the Italian Consulate in Boston OR the Italian Consulate in New York City - your choice.
- **ASA will email you and let you know which Consulate(s) you can apply to.**
- **Check your Consulate website** for updates on requirements and appointments. Processing times vary by consulate and can take longer during peak periods.
- See page 14 for a list of Italian Consulates in the U.S.

Do You Need to Visit the Consulate in Person?:

- **YES**, all students must attend a visa appointment in person unless the consulate instructs you otherwise. Parents or representatives cannot attend in your place but may accompany you. **You may need to travel a long distance (or even fly) to attend the in-person appointment(s). Check your consulate location and plan accordingly.**

When to Apply:

- Apply for your Student Visa **45-60 days before your departure** or **before you need your passport back**, if you have travel planned prior to your program.
- **You will be emailed suggested dates to make an appointment** - ASA must receive required visa letters from your Italian Institution for your visa appointment and this takes time!
- Visa appointments are **by appointment only**, and **appointments fill up quickly**, so do not delay in making your appointment!
- **No expedited processing:** The Italian Consulates do NOT offer rush processing. Ensure you allow ample time for your visa application to be processed before your departure for your program.

Visa Policies and Requirements

- **Required documents vary by consulate:** Always double-check your consulate's website for specific requirements, as documents may differ between consulates.
- **Work restrictions:** You *cannot* work in Italy on a Student Visa.

Steps for Student Visa Applicants

STEP 1: Make an appointment at the Italian Consulate you can go to ASAP: Once accepted to ASA, immediately book your visa appointment. Slots can be scarce, especially in busy periods (holiday seasons).

How to Book Your Appointment:

1. Visit the Italian Consulate's visa booking site: <https://prenotami.esteri.it>
2. Click "**Register Your Account**" and create a profile.
3. Switch the site to English using the "EN" button on the top right.
4. Once your account is created, you select your consulate to access the appointment calendar.
 - Select the Country - STATI UNITI D'AMERICA is USA in Italian.
 - Select Consular Office - STATI UNITI D'AMERICA (the CITY you can apply at)
5. **Book your appointment when you see availability during the advised window:**
Fall semester between early May and mid-July
Spring semester between early October and mid-December

Tips:

- * Appointments (green days) are opened up in a rolling window of small batches.
- * New appointments are typically released in the evenings, between 6:00–6:30PM EST, when cancellations and unconfirmed appointments may become available.
- * Wednesdays, around 6 PM EST, is a common release day/time and you should check then if you find that all spots are filled.

STEP 2: Notify ASA: Once you make an appointment, inform your ASA program manager of the date and consulate you are going to. We will need 2-3 weeks to prepare your ASA provided visa documents and send them to you.

STEP 3: Prepare YOUR required documents at least 2 weeks before your appointment. Review the Consulate's website and ensure you have all of the required documentation you need for a Student Visa - (Long term or National Long Term type D Visa) - study abroad over 90 days.

***IMPORTANT:** Appointments may need to be confirmed 10-3 days before your appointment date. Log in to the [prenotami](https://prenotami.esteri.it) system and navigate to "My Bookings" to see if you need to confirm your appointment. If you do not confirm, your appointment WILL BE CANCELLED, and you will have to reschedule. **Pro tip:** Set yourself a calendar reminder to do this!

STEP 4: Go to your appointment and don't be late! If you have all of the documents in order as they are listed on the consulate's website, your appointment should only take 10-15 minutes.

STEP 5: Once you have your passport back, your visa will be glued inside it - it will say 'VISTO/VISA' at the top and there will be the EU flag (blue with a circle of stars) in the upper left corner. **Upload a scan/picture of your visa into your [ASA Embark](#) portal.**

Required Visa Documents Overview

The documents you must provide for your visa application, along with the required format, **vary by consulate**. The list below includes the **typical required documents** and explanations of each, but **you must also check your consulate's website** for specific requirements and document formats. All documents must be PRINTED and some consulates require multiple copies.

Required Documents:

1. Valid Passport

- Must be signed by you and valid for at least 4 months past the program end date.
- Must have at least two blank pages for the visa to be affixed.

Note: You **must leave your passport** at the consulate for the entire processing time (45-60 days) and cannot travel abroad during this time.

2. Clear, Legible Photocopy of Passport's Picture Page and Signature Page

- In a U.S. passport, these are two consecutive pages.
- Make sure you sign the passport *before* copying.

Note: Ensure the entire first two pages are visible and nothing is cut off.



3. Non-U.S. Citizens: Proof of Current U.S. Status

- Bring your original **green card** or **U.S. visa**, plus a clear, legible photocopy.
- Your green card or visa must be valid at least 3 months beyond your departure date from the Schengen Area.
- If your U.S. visa is in an old passport, bring a copy of the old passport's picture page.

4. Long Stay/National Visa Application Form (type D) for stays over 90 days.

- Download a blank form from your consulate's website and fill out electronically and sign by HAND or fill out legibly by hand using blue or black ink. Print out form.
- Ensure the form says "Application for National Visa (D)" at the top.
- Refer to the enclosed **SAMPLE** (page 7) when filling out the application form.
- Fill out each page exactly as it is filled out on the sample with your appropriate information.

Note: You will be emailed another Long Stay/National Visa Application Form **SAMPLE** specific to your Host Institution to help you fill out questions 25 and 32 (Philadelphia application questions 24 and 27)

5. 1-2 Official Passport Sized Photos

- Photos must be recent, color, and with a **white background**.

Note: Do **not use** self-printed or casual photos; they must be official passport photos (most post offices, CVS, Walgreens, etc. offer passport photo services)

6. **Photocopy of your Student University ID and driver's license (or state ID)**
 - Bring the originals plus photocopies - black and white or color copy is fine.

7. **ASA PROVIDES: Enrollment Letters from the University in Italy (2 Original Copies)**
 - This letter (on letterhead in Italian) is addressed to the Visa Office of the Italian Consulate confirming your admission to the Italian institution.
Note: ASA will provide you with two original copies of this letter. Notify ASA of your visa appointment date so the letter can be obtained on time.
 - **Take BOTH letters to the visa appointment.**

8. **ASA PROVIDES: Letter of Acceptance from ASA (Addressed to Consulate General of Italy)**
 - This letter confirms your participation in the study abroad program.
Note: ASA will provide this letter.

9. **Enrollment Letter from your U.S. College/University**
 - This letter confirms your **full-time enrollment** and **good standing** at your U.S. institution and must state your **study abroad program** in Italy and the **dates** of the program.
Note: Obtain this letter from your college's Study Abroad or International Education Office and ensure it's on official letterhead.

10. **ASA PROVIDES: Proof of International Health Insurance**
 - A letter from CISI Insurance that meets the consulate's requirements.
Note: ASA will provide this letter as coverage is part of your program fee. Students from the University of Minnesota- Duluth can obtain a similar letter from their home university.

11. **Financial Aid Letter** (if required by the consulate, check website)
 - Students who have been granted a scholarship/financial aid are required to provide a letter from their U.S. home university stating the amount and the date of disbursement.
Note: *The ASA Financial Aid Verification (FAV) letter has been accepted at consulates for this purpose;* download this from your ASA Embark portal.

12. **ASA PROVIDES: Proof of Accommodation** (if required by the consulate)
 - This document verifies your housing in Italy for the duration of your program.
Note: ASA will provide this letter if required. The address on this letter may not be where you will actually live, but it is sufficient for visa purposes.

13. **Proof of Funds/Financial Means**
 - You must show proof that you have sufficient funds for your stay in Italy. The consulate may accept one of the following documents:

- **A formal letter from your U.S. bank** on bank letterhead confirming you have at least \$3,500 to \$5,000 in your bank account. Check the consulate website for the exact amount.
- **OR, most recent bank statement(s)**. Must show the *student's name* showing enough funds (at least \$3,500 to \$5,000 total, check the consulate's website for exact amounts). Must be a statement - NOT the balance from an app screenshot.
Note: If using a parent's bank account/statement, you must also provide a notarized Affidavit of Support (found on the consulate website) and potentially other documentation found on the affidavit form.
- *The total amount can be in a checking and/or savings account.*
- **See Guideline for Bank Documents on page 11 for more detailed information.**

14. Visa Processing Fee - usually only money orders are accepted

- Check the consulate website for the exact amount. Make your money order out to the Consulate General of Italy in [City] and use the address of the consulate. Fees range from \$54.30 to \$61.50. Non-U.S. citizens may face different fees. You can purchase one at the U.S. Post Office, your bank, or some pharmacies.



Note: All consulates update their visa fees quarterly (January 1, April 1, July 1, October 1). You must take the correct and exact fee for the quarter of your visa appointment, or it will be rejected, so make sure to check this on your consulate's website BEFORE your appointment.

15. Confirmed Round-Trip Flight Itinerary

- Some consulates may require this, and you must provide proof of **purchased round-trip flights** (U.S. to Schengen area and returning to U.S.).
- This must include all connections of your flight.

16. Once your visa has been processed, you may have 2 choices to get your passport/visa back to you:

- **IN PERSON:** You may be able to go in person and pick up your passport/visa at the consulate.
You do not need to make another appointment to do so. At the end of your appointment, the consular will let you know what date you can return to pick up your passport/visa. Check consulate days/times you are able to do so.
- **OR, MAILED TO YOU:** You may have your passport/visa **mailed to you**.
Some consulates may not allow you to pick up your passport/visa in person and require that you submit a **Declaration for Mailing Passports** form, along with a **pre-paid United States Postal Service priority mail envelope with tracking number**, so they can return your passport by mail. Check your consulate's website for the appropriate form and instructions.

Note: Keep your receipt and tracking number for your records!

Guidelines for Bank Documents

Italian Visa law mandates that students must have a specific amount of available funds in a U.S. checking and/or savings account in order to be issued a student visa. All students must provide bank documentation as part of their visa application.

Amount required: \$35- \$50 per day abroad, which is approximately \$3,500 to \$5,000 per semester depending on program length and consulate requirements

The consulate may accept one of the following documents:

- **A formal letter from your U.S. bank** on bank letterhead confirming you have at least \$3,500 to \$5,000 in your bank account. Check the consulate website for the exact amount. *The total amount can be in a checking and/or savings account.* Bank letters must confirm that you are the account holder (OK if it's a joint account), and that the specified funds are present in your account(s) at the time the letter is generated. If you choose to submit the bank letter, please note the following:
 - Letter must be on bank letterhead & must have the signature of a bank representative. Form letters with electronic signatures are acceptable.
 - Letter must show **student's name**
 - Letter must be the original - NO photocopies
 - **Sample letter** is provided on next page. Your bank may deviate from the suggested format as long as the primary information requested is included.

OR

- **Your most recent bank statement(s).** Must show the **student's name** with at least \$3,500 to \$5,000 in total in your bank account (OK if it's a joint account with parent/guardian name also on it). Check the consulate website for the exact amount and any other details. *The total amount can be in a checking and/or savings account.*
Must be a statement - NOT the balance from an app screenshot.
You can black out the account number.

Note: If a student does NOT have enough funds in their bank account(s) and there is no way to transfer enough funds into your account by your visa appointment date, some consulates allow students to submit bank documentation from a parent/guardian's bank account. In this case, you must also submit a notarized Affidavit of Support (found on the consulate website) completed by your parent/guardian and any other documentation found on the affidavit form or consulate website regarding this.

FAQs

Why is the visa process necessary?

Each country, including Italy, requires a visa to ensure that foreign students can support themselves while studying. This is a reciprocal process—similar to the requirements for Italians to study here in the U.S.

What if I am studying abroad for more than one semester?

If studying in Italy for more than one semester, additional documents may be required for your visa. ASA will provide guidance and/or consult your consulate's website for specific requirements.

What if I am a student under the age of 18?

Additional documentation is required for minors. ASA will provide guidance and/or consult your consulate's website for specific requirements.

I've called the Consulate, but they never answer the phone. What should I do?

Some don't accept calls, have limited hours, or won't answer visa questions by phone. Try calling at different times if you need to speak to someone. Email is usually the best option. Be patient, as replies may take several business days, and check your spam folder for their response.

What if my visa is denied?

100% of our students have been successful in getting a Student Visa. If you apply for your visa on time (recommended: 45-60 days prior to departure) and bring all the required paperwork, there should be no reason your visa won't be granted.

What happens if my visa is delayed?

Although it's rare, if your visa isn't ready by your departure date, you may need to delay your departure. Apply early to avoid this situation.

What is the average processing time for a student visa?

The average processing time for a student visa is 15-30 days (not counting mailing). **Italian Consulates do NOT have an expedited visa processing service.** You must apply on-time, or you risk not receiving your visa before your departure date.

What if my passport and visa are not returned prior to my departure date?

Students whose passports and visas have not been returned to them prior to their scheduled departure date will have to wait for their passport and visa to be returned to them before traveling.

What else do I need to do to stay legally in Italy?

After arrival in Italy, you must apply for a **Permit of Stay (Permesso di Soggiorno)** within 8 days. This costs up to **\$250** and is mandatory. ASA will assist you with this process after you arrive in Italy. You will need to bring some photocopies of some of the visa documents with you to Italy for this process. ASA will provide you with these details prior to departure.
